1. The old weather kiosk (see above) was sold at auction at 11:00 a.m. today for only \$3.00 to H. B. **Damon**, Wichita salesman, by Wichita meteorologist, M. B. Stubbs, who acted as auctioneer. The kiosk, which weighs about 3500 pounds, must be moved from the present site and the sidewalk restored by the purchaser. It was put in operation here in January 1913 after a successful petition sponsored by the Wichita Real Estate Board the year before, to the Department of Agriculture, which was then in charge of the weather bureaus and had purchased a number of kiosks in 1912 to erect in various parts of the country.
