They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle or Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Library, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

Suggested names for the town include the following: Eastland Gardens, Eastland Heights, Bancroft Hill, Douglas Heights, Sunrise Terrace, and Fair Acres. The lots will be placed on the market in the spring.

It is part of the Sankey estate, and was sold by A. T. Butler, business manager of the Beacon.
