Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

3. Meeting is called for Saturday to consider organization of an agricultural society and to establish a county fair.

Thursday, May 8, 1873

 Directors of Sedgwick County Agricultural Society met Saturday and accepted Mr. R. A. Neely's proposition for a site for a fair grounds. It consists of 40 acres lying just east of Chisholm creek, opposite the stock yards.

Thursday, July 10, 1873

2. Report of meeting July 8th of committee of Sedgwick County Agricultural Society reporting the purchase for fair grounds of 40 acres of land from J. H. Dagner, lying north of Wichita and north of Munger's. Price is \$1500 to be paid \$500 in paid-up stock, \$500 at close of the fair, and \$500 in 12 months at 12 % per annum, secured by mortgage on land and improvements.

The *Eagle* of August 30, 1877 announced such a meeting on the last day of the fair, and this was subsequently held on September 27, 1877.

4. Article reports opening yesterday of the Wichita Horse Fair in Riverside park, at foot of Central ave. ¶The old Street Railway company has completed an extension west on Central ave. from Main st., giving service to the park. During the fair extra cars will

run on Central from Main, giving connections with all Main st. cars.

Thursday, November 3, 1887

4. Soon after the close of the Wichita and Southwestern Horse Fair it was urged that a company be organized to hold a general fair here next fall. A site would be the next consideration. ¶The association will meet today and take steps for changing the original charter and company. The new company will be styled the Wichita Inter-State Fair Association and organized with capital stock of \$100,000. ¶Site for the grounds has been selected, it being the baseball grounds and several acres adjoining it belonging to Mr. N. A. English. 75 acres can be secured. Mr. English would not sell it but agreed yesterday to give a lease to the association lasting ten years. The location is just two miles from Main and Douglas, with two street car lines completed to the grounds near the river. ¶The improvement on the ball grounds amount to \$8,000 and are included in the lease. The amphitheater is one of the best in the state. The fencing will have to be removed, but the grounds will give room for a mile race track.

It seems that the grandstand erected by the baseball association is not suitably located to be used by the fair association, and will have to be torn down, but the lumber can be used in some of the buildings that will be erected.

The Rock Island is putting in a switch on Levy st. to the Wichita Exposition and Inter-State Fair grounds. The new fair grounds at fast being put into shape. The mile track is nearing completion and the fence is being constructed. The large amphitheater formerly used at the baseball grounds is on trucks ready to be moved to its position on the new track.

3. Letter describes the new grounds of the Wichita Exposition and Inter-State Fair Association, located two miles south of Douglas ave. and Main st., just outside the city limits. Description and details. Has a one mile track.

5. Yesterday was the opening day of the spring races at the new grounds of the Wichita Exposition and Interstate Fair association. Attendance was estimated at between 2,500 and 3,000. The street railway company brought in cars from the outside lines and had 30 cars conveying people from Douglas ave. to the grounds. By the way, they received five new large cars last evening and they were put on the track last night and are ready for service today. The company will have today over 40 cars for use at hours when they are most needed by the crowd. While the taking of cars from outside lines for an hour or two may inconvenience one man, it may accommodate 50, and hence they conclude to accommodate the greater number. The outside service, however, will be neglected as little as possible.
