The "boy with the boot" statue, which stood in a fountain in Riverside park for years, is to be seen for the first time in several years at the Wichita Garden club flower show at the Forum. ¶ Patched and repaired with wood and cement as well as it could be after being knocked to pieces by a wild automobile, the boy once more holds up an old boot to watch the water trickle out of it into a lily pond, which forms the centerpiece at the display. ¶ It has been laid away in a store room for some time. "Originally it was a gift to the city of a very well known woman here, Mrs. L. E. Carter." (sic)
