

*Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.*

6. Article reports 40 acres of ground have been secured to make a large park surrounding Mt. Carmel academy. A curving boulevard will be opened north and south on the east side of it, inclining toward the convent in the center.

**Saturday, October 29, 1904****page**

5. Addition to Mt. Carmel academy to be built on the north of the main building for about \$35,000. At present the school consists of two large four story buildings.

**Saturday, January 28, 1905****page**

5. Plans for the new addition to Mt. Carmel academy are being completed by Architect C. W. Terry. It is to be three stories and the same size as the present building, thus doubling the capacity of the school. Cost about \$35,000.

**Sunday, September 3, 1905****page**

2. The new addition to Mt. Carmel is well under way but may not be completed as soon as expected because of delays in getting brick and other material. It is to be 115 feet by 68 feet and in architectural harmony with the addition of two years ago.

**Saturday, April 7, 1906****page**

5. The new addition to Mt. Carmel Academy will be dedicated Tuesday, April 17.

21. Article describes Mt. Carmel academy at length. Steady growth since organized 16 years ago. Details.
