Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

Murdock, has been cited for contempt in district court on basis of charge filed by his former wife, Sally, that he is \$1947.50 in arrears on alimony and support money ordered against him by Judge Robert L. NeSmith on July 7, 1938. ¶ The order was issued at the time Mrs. Murdock obtained a divorce from her husband. Murdock was ordered to pay \$9600 alimony at the rate of \$40 a month for 20 years and \$65 a month support for his two children until further order of the court. ¶ Following the divorce hearing Murdock was reported to have gone to Oregon. He returned to Wichita about 10 days ago. ¶ Hearing on the contempt citation to be held Friday.
