Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

At that time she was named co-trustee of Mrs. Murdock's estate. In 1939 she started assembling the Murdock collection when the trust established in Mrs. Murdock's will came into being. 1B. Report of death Friday in a New York hospital of Elizabeth Stubblefield Navas, 84, former Wichitan and trustee of the Murdock art collection at Wichita Art Museum. In 1925, at age 20, she was named trustee for planning and acquisition of a city art collection, as requested in the will of her friend and employer, Louise Caldwell Murdock. She had moved to New York City in 1917 and began preparing herself as an art expert. Her husband, Rafael, died in 1939. ¶ She was the daughter of Elmer E. and Carrie Stubblefield and was born in Coffeyville, Kansas in 1895. Grew up in Independence, Kansas and moved to Wichita with her family after completing high school there. Her older sister, Josephine, was a pianist who studied at Oberlin (Ohio) College. The sister, Josephine, was the mother of a surviving nephew, Ed Turner, president of Head's Shoe Company, located in the Caldwell-Murdock Building in
