Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

6. The design for the official post card for Kansas Day, January 29, 1913, has been accepted by the committee appointed for the purpose by the Kansas Development Association. The design was submitted by the H. R. Schmidt and Company postcard house, and is the work of C. A. Seward, designer for the Capper Engraving Company.

3. C. A. Seward, formerly manager of the Capper Engraving Company plant in Wichita, and recently art director of the Capper Publications at Topeka, has returned to Wichita, having accepted the position of art director of the Southwestern Advertising Company, with offices in the Bitting Building.

B-9. Interview with William Finn, giving early history of Wichita. He came here in winter of 1869 at age 21 and walked from Emporia to Wichita.
