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Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

On foggy May 1 ship ran through survivors from British destroyer sunk in collision with battleship King George V. ¶ On July 2, 3, and 4, 1942 the ship was in the fiasco when British Admiralty ordered ships in convoy to scatter and nearly all were sunk. ¶ Left Norfolk, Virginia October 28 for November 8 D-Day in North Africa. Engaged ships and shore batteries at Casablanca and received one hit from a shore battery. ¶ On November 11 the Wichita left for the United States for repairs and to make ready to depart for the South Pacific. ¶ She arrived at New Caldonia on January 3, 1943 and there the aviation unit was put ashore (Larsen's unit) because the canvas covered Curtiss seaplanes were considered fire hazards.
