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Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

Diners account for fifty percent of the production. Founder of the company was Arthur H. Valentine, a Wichita restauranteur and promoter. Valentine died in 1953. After several owners, the company was purchased by the Radcliff family in 1958. Byron Radcliff is president and Robert J. Radcliff is vice-president and general manager, and Kent Radcliff, secretary-treasurer. When they purchased the firm it was located at 1446 Barwise. The McComas Street factory was started in the fall of 1959 and occupied in early 1960. ¶ More than 70 of the Valentine structures are situated in Wichita, although the buildings are now in every state in the nation. Service stations now represent 25 percent of the firm's business. ¶ Several thousand diners have been built in the last 24 years at prices ranging from \$10,000 to \$30,000. The original diner had six stools, but now the most popular model seats are up to 40. The all-steel buildings are shipped in sections from Wichita to their future sites. ¶ The company employs 40 persons.
