Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

The addition will conform to the main portion of the building, which is four stories high. To cost at least \$15,000. ¶ The institution is for young ladies and is maintained by the Catholic church.

6. The Catholics of the Wichita Diocese are planing to erect a \$20,000 mansion for the residence of Bishop Hennessy. Location not yet decided. ¶ The building now occupied by Bishop Hennessy, situated near All Hallows academy, will be remodeled and converted into a boarding college for boys, to be opened next September.

13. Mount Carmel Academy is the new name for All Hallows, Wichita's young ladies' boarding school. The name was suggested by Bishop Hennessey, who has always held that "All Hallows" was not an appropriate name for a young ladies' seminary. The famous "All Hallows" of Ireland is a boys school, and it was a priest who graduated from that institution who christened the Wichita academy in honor of his alma mater. ¶ Article describes in detail the new addition built at a cost of \$40,000. The enrollment is expected to expand from the present 88 to about 200 in a year or two.

5A. Mount Carmel Academy will be closed at the end of the 1953-54 school year and the

land, buildings, and part of the furnishings and equipment will be offered for sale, it has been announced from the Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, at Dubuque, Iowa. The cornerstone of All Hallows academy was laid November 1, 1886 and the first four sisters arrived here July 26, 1887 and opened school in September of that year with an enrollment of 21 pupils. With increasing enrollment the south wing of the present academy was completed in 1902, and at that time the name was changed to Mt. Carmel academy at the request of Bishop Hennessy. The north wing was built in 1908, and St. Joseph's residence hall was erected in 1920-21. Decision to close was made primarily because of a shortage of sisters in schools operated by the order. The original plans contemplated the building of two additions, of which the one now planned is the center. When both additions are completed, the old building will be the north wing of the structure.

5. Plans are being drawn by E. Dumont, architect, for the main building of All Hallows academy, and work is to begin as soon as they are completed. To be four stories, 155 frontage by 75 feet depth, and cost \$30,000. The building now in use will become the north wing.
