island for a baseball diamond. Grading has begun and seats will be erected.

Being built by the Ellis Construction Company at cost of about \$15,000 and will be completed by next Saturday. ¶ Has total length of 264 feet in three sections, east section along first base line 48 feet long, center section 96 feet long, and west section along third base line 120 feet long. Two hundred and four boxes in front of entire length of the grand stand. Seating capacity of grand stand will be close to 5000 and bleachers will seat 1200, making total seating capacity of 6200. Center field fence will be 400 feet from home base and right field fence 267 feet.

The bleachers at the third base line are being torn down and will be replaced by an enlarged grandstand with about 50 boxes and 1500 more grandstand seats, giving a total of 5000 grandstand seats instead of the former 3500. Bleachers will be erected later either down the right field foul line or opposite the first base. Details.

3. The colored boys of Wichita have organized a baseball club. Their grounds are just north of town, and they practice Saturday afternoons.

5. The Wichita baseball team is now a permanent organization. Griswold park could not be secured so the fair grounds have been secured as a ball park. The grandstand at the fair grounds is one of the finest in the state.

Sunday, March 13, 1898

5. Article reports the nickname selected for the Wichita baseball team is the "Wichita Eagles."

Thursday, March 24, 1898

page

5. Work on the grand stand at the baseball park will commence immediately. It will be 120 feet long with ten tiers of seats, giving seating capacity of at least 1,000. The first game is April 8 between the Wichita Eagles and the Kansas City Blues.

Saturday, April 9, 1898

page

5. Article reports on first baseball game at Athletic park yesterday. Kansas City Blues beat Wichita Eagles 12 to 2. One thousand fans present.

Thursday, September 8, 1898

page

5. Baseball in Wichita is over for the season and workmen yesterday started tearing down the fence and grandstand at Athletic park. When it was built a note was given B. F. McLean for \$225, the balance due on the lumber. A few days ago O. E. Keach purchased the fence and the stand in order to get rid of the park, as he resides just across the street and was opposed to Sunday games.

Thursday, March 10, 1904

5. Article reports that Wichita is to be in the Southwestern Baseball League. Location of the grounds will be made public tomorrow.

Saturday, January 14, 1905

5. Article reports Wichita stands good chance of getting into the new Western Association baseball league, which is a successor to the Missouri Valley league. Cities formerly in the league were Joplin, Springfield, Sedalia, Leavenworth, Topeka, Pittsburg, Iola, and Fort Scott.

Saturday, February 18, 1905

5. About 15 leading business men of Wichita yesterday purchased the Pittsburg franchise on the Western Association and turned it over to Frank Isbell, who will have full management. ¶ The question of a park has not been definitely settled.

Sunday, March 12, 1905

11. The park proposition for Wichita's new baseball team in the Western Association has practically been closed. Quarters in the northeast corner of the fair grounds have been secured, and the erection of the new \$1,500 grandstand and other improvements will begin next week.

7. Work on the fence and grandstand for the new baseball park on South Main street will start today. Very little grading will have to be done.

Friday, March 17, 1905

7. Work started yesterday on building the new grand stand, bleachers, and fence at the baseball park in South Wichita. If the weather remains good, it will be completed in time for the games with the Chicago White Sox on March 29 and 30.

Saturday, April 1, 1905

7. The new baseball park will be dedicated this afternoon when the Regulars and the Yannagans will meet in an exhibition game.

24. Article gives history of Western Association baseball league and its predecessor, the Missouri Valley League, which was organized in 1902 and changed in 1905 to the Western Association.

 Yesterday the Wichita baseball club passed out of the hands of Lawrence Milton and W. J. Kimmel and was taken over by the local company which has been formed and is known as the Wichita Baseball company.

5. Deposed manager of baseball team, W. J. Kimmel, who owns 61 foot strip of ground extending across north end of Association park between Main and Water, built a barbed wire fence around his property yesterday cutting off 20 feet inside the north fence of the ball park.

5. Article reports settling of Wichita's "base ball war" (see July 18) between W. J. Kimmel and the Wichita Baseball company.

19. Article about effort to get Wichita into Western Association in 1904-05.

6. Negotiations are being carried on for Frank Isbell, second baseman of the Chicago White Sox, to purchase the Western association franchise of the Wichita Jobbers and manage the team next year.

7. The name of the Wichita baseball team is to be changed this winter, according to Managers Holland and Isbell. The present management dislikes the name of "Jobbers," which was adopted during the first year of the baseball association.

7. Wichita has been admitted to the Western League. Previously was in Western Association.

Sunday, December 6, 1908

page

7. Local baseball park to be reconstructed for next season at cost of \$4,000. Present grand stands are to be torn down and a new one built with a seating capacity for 2,500.

7. A new name is wanted for the Wichita baseball team. With the entry of the city into the Western League, the name of "Jobbers," which has hung to the club since its entry into the Western association, will be discarded.

Sunday, July 16, 1911

15. Article reports Association park is to be abandoned. Tony Weinschenk, owner of the grounds and equipment, is ending the lease of Frank Isbell, owner of the former Wichita Jobbers, this fall, and the fence, grandstands, bleachers, and club house will be torn down and the lumber sold. The ground will be subdivided into lots and sold for residences. ¶ Association park is located on South Main street, near the old fair grounds. It was fenced and equipped for the old Wichita team of the Western association in the spring of 1905. Since then a second grandstand has been built and the park remodeled.
