Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

WICHITA BEACON Wednesday, June 26, 1940 page

1. Stearman Aircraft Division of the Boeing Airplane Company received the largest aircraft order ever received by a Wichita manufacturer. It calls for construction of \$3,779,258 worth of primary training planes and parts to be used by the navy. Additional expansion of the Stearman plant will be carried out and the company plans to operate two full shifts instead of the one full shift now employed. Details.

Thursday, August 22, 1940 page

1. Announcement made in Washington yesterday of plans to expand Boeing's Wichita plant to approximately five times its present size. A three million dollar Reconstruction Finance Corporation loan has been approved to finance the plant expansion. Details of the plans are not yet available, but the interest rate on the loan will be four percent and it is to be repaid in five years.

Sunday, September 29, 1940 page

1. J. Earl Schaefer, general manager, yesterday announced a \$545,000 expansion program that will enable the Stearman Aircraft Division of the Boeing Airplane Company to employ 3000 workers and double the present rate of production. Work on the new structure will begin Monday morning on the west side of the present plant and will increase the present 200,000 square feet of plant space to 300,000 square feet. Article also refers to a proposed Number 2 Stearman plant to be built entirely separate from the present factory. Details.

Wednesday, October 16, 1940 page

1. Announcement made today of details of plans for new warplane factory to be built for Stearman Aircraft Division of Boeing Airplane Company at cost of approximately \$3,500,000. Construction to start next week. Plant to have 442,000 square feet and employ 4000 persons and will build parts for the Boeing B-17 bombers. These will be

shipped to Seattle for assembly. New factory to be 1900 feet long and 330 feet wide and will be completed about March 1. Further details. A year ago Stearman had approximately 560 employes and at present it has approximately 1550. Drawing of new plant.

Tuesday, October 22, 1940 page

1. Contracts let yesterday for the new units to be built under the Beech Aircraft Company's \$1,600,000 expansion program. ¶ Excavation was started yesterday for the new Number 2 plant for the Stearman Division of Boeing. Santa Fe Railroad is building a one mile track to the new plant, to be completed in ten days.

Thursday, October 24, 1940 page

1. Article says Boeing Airplane Company contemplates a new aircraft factory in Wichita five times as large as the huge new unit started by the company here Monday. The latter is only the first stage of a factory which will eventually employ 14,000 persons and build complete four motored "flying fortresses." Details.

Entire expansion is due for completion in 140 days.

Cessna's war contracts have all been cancelled and 300 of the company's employes will be terminated Monday. Beech has terminated a large number of employes. ¶ The International Association of Machinists says approximately 10,000 workers have been terminated and another 7000 will be laid off by the first week of September.

1. Wichita's Boeing Plant Number 2 was offered for sale or lease yesterday by the war assets administration, officials announced here. Sealed bids are to be submitted by October 1. Government cost of the 185 acres of land plus building is estimated at \$17,811,000. Details.

Thursday, February 26, 1948 page

1. Title to the Boeing Plant 2 was transferred yesterday from the war assets administration to the United States army air force. The property, including 14 buildings, and 185

acres of land, originally cost the government \$17,811,000. Details.

Wednesday, April 21, 1948 page

5. The United States air force formally accepted accountability for Boeing plant 2 yesterday, taking the plant from the United States army engineers, who previously had accepted it from the war assets administration. Details.

Friday, May 7, 1948 page

1. Boeing's Wichita plant is now employing 3000 workers, 1300 of whom have been hired since the work of opening Plant 2 started a month ago. Present plans call for a steady expansion of this number to 6 to 7000 workers by August 1. Thirty five B-29s and five B-50s have already flown to Wichita to be worked on. Details. Photo.
