Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

Article on page two gives history, refers to it as Kansas' pioneer radio station – says it was founded as a non-commercial station in Wichita on College Hill as WAAP by Wilbur Cooper in July 1923. Cooper and his associates sold the station in 1925 and it was moved to Milford, Kansas as KFKB. The Farmers and Bankers Life Insurance Company of Wichita bought it in January 1931 and moved the studios to Abilene under call letters KFBI on July 10, 1932. Remote studios were opened in Salina in August 1935. Drawing on page 1 of the new transmitting station at 42nd and North Broadway. Architects were Overend and Boucher. Power is 5000 watts. Studios are on fifth floor of Farmers and Banker Insurance Company building at 1st and Market. Photos.
