

Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

9. The three story National Bank of Commerce building, 25 by 100 feet, on southwest corner of Main and Douglas, was sold yesterday to W. H. Stanley, Edmund Stanley, and W. R. Jones for \$125,000.

1. The National Bank of Commerce building at southwest corner of Main and Douglas was bought yesterday by oil men Professor Edmund Stanley, W. H. Stanley, and W. R. (Tex) Jones reportedly for \$125,000, with possession to be given within a year, after the new bank building at northwest corner is completed. ¶ The three story cut stone building was erected in 1903 for \$35,000, with 25 foot frontage on Douglas avenue. It replaced a two story brick structure used by the old State National Bank, which went out of business in 1893. The National Bank of Commerce has always been located there, having opened for business in 1896.

10. The Wheeler, Kelly and Hagny Company yesterday purchased from Deering J. Marshall the two story brick building at 128-130 North Market for \$35,000 as an investment. The building is on the site of the old City Hotel, once quite notorious. The 29 foot two story building adjoining this one on the south, also formerly owned by Deering J. Marshall, was sold yesterday by the Southwestern Electric Company to W. H. Stanley for \$40,000.

5. The Jefferson Hotel, 627 East Douglas, was purchased Saturday by Colonel S. B. Amidon from W. H. Stanley and Darcy Dunne of Wichita and John H. Moore of Kansas City for

approximately \$100,000 as an investment. It was erected by J. P. Mahan 15 years ago.

2. Article about search for heirs of Dr. Henry O. Burleigh, early Wichita physician and property owner north of Murdock Street. Two sons living, Dean, in Wichita, and another in Texas, and two daughters, Mrs. W. H. Stanley, 304 North Belmont, and Mrs. Rolla Smith, of Suburban Rest.

in infancy. Suburban Rest was founded 28 years ago, and lately has been managed by Mrs. Smith's daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Verner Asp. Survived by three sons, Reginald and Richard Smith of Wichita, and Don Allen Smith, of San Diego, California, one sister, Mrs. W. H. Stanley, of Wichita, two brothers, Dean Burleigh, of Wichita, and Ernest Burleigh of Corpus Christi, Texas; one grand-daughter, Billie Lu Asp; and four grandsons, Kenneth, Allen, Ronnie, Jerry, and Stanley Smith (sic).
