FORMER SLAVE, James Ellis Pope

James Ellis Pope, age seventy-one years, lives at 920 East Tenth Street, Hutchinson, Kansas.

James Pope was just one year old when the war was over. He was born on the plantation of Richard Pope in Warren County, Kentucky, fifteen miles from Woodborn. James' mother, Eliza (Ray) Pope, was a slave, but his father, Richard Pope, was a free negro.

Just before the old master, Richard Pope, died, he gave James' grandmother, Tilda Pope, one hundred and sixty acres of land, but after the Master's death, his sons demanded that Tilda return the land to them, or give up her baby boy. Tilda refused the land and for they freed her son, who was James Pope's father.

James' grandmother on his mother's side was Nancy Ray. When her master died, he gave her one hundred acres of land and at her death, her daughter, Eliza Ray, James' mother, inherited the land. This was at the close of the war. So Nancy Ray Pope, her husband, Richard Pope, and family moved on the one hundred acres and his mother lived there until her death in 1919. James Pope came to Hutchinson at the age of forty-five years.
