

Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

BEACON 1890

Saturday, March 29, 1890

1. Article reporting objections of city engineer **Jackman** to changes in the specifications for the Jasperite paving of East Douglas avenue made by the Drake company and signed by Mayor Clement without knowledge of Mr. **Jackman**. Details. (Denied by mayor -- page 1, April 8, 1890.)

BEACON 1906

Wednesday, July 25, 1906

6. Building of additional switch tracks on the joint railroad tracks of the Lassen-**Jackman** mill will be completed tomorrow.

Thursday, September 13, 1906

page

5. More than 100 men are engaged in construction of the mammoth new Lassen-**Jackman** mill and elevator. Active work commenced in May on the site that was last year a forest of weeds and sunflowers on the Santa Fe tracks between 12th and 13th streets. The elevator towers seven stories, with galvanized iron covering it, and south of the elevator six immense sheet iron storage tanks are being built, of which three have been completed to their height of 60 feet. East of the elevator, the brick building will contain the mill. Capacity of the elevator is 300,000 bushels, and each of the six storage tanks has a capacity of 40,000 bushels, or a total of 240,000 bushels. Details.

- B-1. The Adeline Apartments, at corner of 13th and Emporia, were sold yesterday to David S. **Jackman**, treasurer of the Kansas Milling Company, by Thomas C. Naylor, who built them two years ago.

7. Report of death yesterday of Charles Moore **Jackman**, widely known Kansas flour miller and president of the Kansas Milling Company, at age 71. Obituary. Came to Kansas in 1885 and to Wichita in 1906. Survived by wife, two sons and two daughters (named). Photograph.

WICHITA BEACON 1941**Wednesday, January 29, 1941****page**

1. D. S. **Jackman**, manager of the Kansas Milling Company, announced plans to start construction immediately on new elevators to increase the capacity of the company's elevator at 13th and Santa Fe by 700,000 bushels, giving a total capacity of 2,200,000 bushels. The addition will be complete in time to handle part of the 1941 wheat and will cost \$100,000. Contractors are Chambers and Bolton, of Hutchinson. ¶ Total capacity of Wichita's elevators at time of last harvest was 12,845,000 bushels, and this will be increased to 14,295,000 bushels for the 1941 harvest.

WICHITA EAGLE 1906**Tuesday, April 17, 1906****page**

6. The Missouri Pacific yesterday started work on the Association switch that is to give the Lassen-**Jackman** mill and the Otto Weiss alfalfa food mill track facilities.

Thursday, April 26, 1906**page**

6. Laying of rails will start today on the association switch track to the Lassen-**Jackman** mill and the Otto Weiss mill.

Sunday, April 29, 1906**page**

7. Building permit issued to Lassen and **Jackman** for flour mill and elevator 200 feet by 42 feet with engine house 26 feet by 72 feet. Cost \$125,000.

Friday, June 15, 1906**page**

5. Good progress is being made on construction of the new Lassen-**Jackman** mill. The foundation for the elevator has been built and framework built up several feet. Another force of men is building the foundation for the mill buildings.

Tuesday, July 10, 1906**page**

5. The large elevator for the Lassen-**Jackman** mill at 12th street and Santa Fe is almost

completed, and the bricklayers have started work on the mill building. The mill will have capacity of 1,500 barrels per day with storage capacity of 350,000 bushels in the elevator.

EAGLE 1922**Wednesday, April 5, 1922****page**

2. Article reporting that expenditure of \$25,000 to increase its manufacturing capacity to 1000 tires a day is one of the first steps of re-organization of the Mid-Continent Tire Manufacturing company according to H. B. McMasters, who last week succeeded David S. **Jackman** as general manager. A working capital of \$200,000 is to be obtained by issuance of first mortgage bonds. The debt on the company building has been liquidated by directors who took second mortgage on the property.

5. David S. **Jackman** of Kansas Milling Company yesterday purchased the Adeline Apartments, 13th and Emporia, from Thomas C. Naylor, builder of the apartments, for \$160,000. There are 30 apartments with annual revenue of \$16,000.

5. The Adeline apartments at 13th and Emporia were sold yesterday by D. S. **Jackman** to Lawrence A. Williamson, of St. Louis for \$125,000.
