Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

5. Letter from Chief of the Bureau of Ordnance in Washington, D.C. to Garfield Post in Wichita says "The Honorable Chester I. Long has requested this bureau to issue to your post a condemned cannon and four pyramids of cannon balls. ¶ A list of those available is herewith enclosed, and you are requested to indicate the particular kind you desire."

5. Wichita will get her Spanish cannon after all. The war department has finally released the captured Spanish cannon for distribution to cities about the country, and the persistent effort by Mayor Ross has been successful in obtaining one for Wichita according to a letter from Congressman Chester I.
