They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Mount Carmel Academy will be closed at the end of the 1953-54 school year and the land, buildings, and part of the furnishings and equipment will be offered for sale, it has been announced from the Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, at Dubuque, Iowa. The cornerstone of All Hallows academy was laid November 1, 1886 and the first four sisters arrived here July 26, 1887 and opened school in September of that year with an enrollment of 21 pupils. With increasing enrollment the south wing of the present academy was completed in 1902, and at that time the name was changed to Mt. Carmel academy at the request of Bishop Hennessy. The north wing was built in 1908, and St. Joseph's residence hall was erected in 1920-21. Decision to close was made primarily because of a shortage of sisters in schools operated by the order. The new Mount Carmel replaces the academy at 3100 West Douglas, which will become a boys High School operated by the Christian Brothers.
