Dr. Edward N. Tihen (1924-1991) was an avid reader and researcher of Wichita newspapers. His notes from Wichita newspapers -- the "Tihen Notes," as we call them -- provide an excellent starting point for further research. They present brief synopses of newspaper articles, identify the newspaper -- Eagle, Beacon or Eagle-Beacon -- in which the stories first appeared, and give exact references to the pages on which the articles are found. Microfilmed copies of these newspapers are available at the Wichita State University Libraries, the Wichita Public Library, or by interlibrary loan from the Kansas State Historical Society.

WICHITA BEACON Thursday, January 19, 1888 page

1. The incorporators of *St. Francis* hospital met yesterday and elected a board of directors: M. W. Levy, John Davidson, B. H. Campbell, A. W. Oliver, H. Schweiter, J. P. Allen, J. V. Davidson, Christopher Reed, William Griffenstein, M. J. Casey, and P. V. Healy, with B. H. Campbell chosen president, M. W. Levy, secretary, and J. Davidson, treasurer. ¶ The lease of the Burleigh brick building on North 4th avenue was secured and a charter drawn up and sent to Topeka. When the charter returns, the medical staff will be appointed. The hospital will have 42 rooms and be divided into male and female medical and surgical wards, obstetrical ward, gynecological ward and a ward for children. It will be opened about February 10th and will be in charge of the Sisters of Mercy.

Tuesday, June 5, 1888 page

1. Report on the work being done by the Sisters of Charity in the *St. Francis* Hospital on North 4th avenue and urging better support of the institution. Three stories above a basement, with 30 or 35 rooms in all. Report lists donations to the hospital.

1. The city council yesterday voted to give the *St. Francis* hospital \$75 per month and to raise the monthly stipend granted to the Ladies Benevolent Home to the same amount. The council has been giving the Home \$50 per month heretofore.

1. Members of the women's association of *St. Francis* hospital will meet October 24 to make comforts for the hospital.

Friday, May 17, 1889

page

1. There is less sickness throughout the city than at any time this year. At *St. Francis* hospital there are 18 patients and at the Benevolent home only seven cases of sickness.

Saturday, June 15, 1889

page

1. Note from Sisters of Mercy (i.e., *St. Francis* hospital) saying the number of free patients during the last six months has drawn on their limited funds and asking for the generous charity of the citizens of Wichita.

Tuesday, June 25, 1889

page

4. The *St. Francis* hospital is said to show a preference to poor paupers. At present it is crowded with poor patients while those with money are turned away.

Wednesday, June 26, 1889

page

1. The Sisters of Mercy at *St. Francis* hospital will appeal publicly, for the first time, to the generous public for substantial assistance. Owing to the great number of charity patients, their financial condition is at present at its lowest ebb.

Tuesday, July 2, 1889

page

1. Picnic at Riverside park to be held July 4 for the benefit of *St. Francis* hospital. Prices are: coffee 5ϕ , ice cream and cake 15ϕ , and sandwiches 5ϕ .

Wednesday, December 4, 1889

page

2. City physician reports the number of paupers in local hospitals. *St. Francis* hospital 10, Wichita hospital 10, City hospital 7.

Monday, September 8, 1890 page

4. The three hospitals in Wichita are all on one street -- 4th avenue -- two north of Douglas and one south, and many people get them confused. The City hospital is farthest north and is the newest in the city. It is at 1105 North 4th and is under the auspices of the homeopathic branch of the medical profession. Next is *St. Francis* at 957 North 4th. The third, Wichita hospital, formerly called the Benevolent home, is the oldest and is at 1021 South 4th and is the largest of the three hospitals. ¶ In addition, the Children's Home on Ohio street, is an important institution and cares for one to two dozen infants who are orphans or neglected or abused. On September 1 the hospitals had 27 patients in all -- 7 at City, 13 at *St. Francis*, and 7 at the Wichita.

Wednesday, March 6, 1895 page

5. The *St. Francis* hospital and the City hospital have been voted \$900 a year each by the legislature.

Tuesday, August 24, 1897 page

5. Work started yesterday on excavation for a new addition to *St. Francis* hospital. To be built on the south side of the main building, to be 36 by 43 feet and two stories high. Cost about \$5,000. To be completed about November 1st. Details.

Wednesday, November 17, 1897 page

5. The *St. Francis* hospital addition has been completed.

Monday, March 28, 1898

page

8. A chapel, 43 by 22 feet, is being added to the north end of *St. Francis* Hospital. The material will be brick and stone. N. Hartle is doing the work.

Saturday, September 17, 1898

page

5. Doctors J. W. Shultz and S. P. Thomas have purchased the Burleigh property just north of *St. Francis* hospital and will establish a hospital there.

Monday, April 10, 1899 page

5. Bishop Hennessy yesterday dedicated the new addition to *St. Francis* hospital and gave some history of the institution. Says half a dozen sisters at his invitation nine years ago

took charge of a rented building to take care of the sick in Wichita. Today they not only own the original building but also two large additions and a chapel, and the entire square of ground of which the original property formed the northeast corner. These improvements have cost in excess of \$50,000. Details.

Tuesday, June 20, 1899 page

6. Mr. J. L. Bowdish, a resident of North 4th avenue has suggested that the name of that street north of Douglas be changed to *St. Francis* street as a tribute to the great hospital of that name which has so much improved the north part of it.

5. **St. Francis** hospital is considering building an addition at the south end which will about double its capacity. Details.

Saturday, July 13, 1901 page

13. Long article describing Wichita's hospitals. Says a large addition is to be built on the west side of *St. Francis* hospital next fall. Details ("Wichita Is Proud").

Monday, February 3, 1902 page

5. Plans for the new wing at *St. Francis* hospital are now being drawn by architect Dumont. The new addition will extend from the present building to Emporia avenue.

Saturday, August 2, 1902 page

5. The new addition to *St. Francis* hospital is nearly completed and will probably be ready for occupancy by November. The new part is at the back of the old hospital and reaches almost to Emporia avenue. It is four stories high, 120 feet By 40 feet, and wire porches extend the full length of the building on each floor on the south and west sides. It will contain 45 rooms, several wards and an operating room. Cost about \$25,000. It is only slightly smaller than the main hospital, which is 170 by 47 feet and has 50 rooms. Details.

Saturday, January 31, 1903 page

10. Article reports 770 patients were treated at *St. Francis* hospital in 1902. Of these 385 were treated free of charge. The third addition to the hospital—a chapel and a modern steam laundry—was erected in 1902.

1. Article says the *St. Francis* hospital plans to build a new chapel. Plans have been drawn by Architect Masqueray, of St. Paul, who also drew the new plans for the cathedral. To cost \$10,000. The new one may be built on the south of the present main building and face Emporia avenue, which ground is owned by the sisters.

5. Drawing of the new addition now being finished at *St. Francis* hospital. It is 42 by 62 feet, and in the rear is seen the spire of the new chapel, which is 47 by 53 feet.

10. A six foot high statue of *St. Francis* will soon be placed in the cupola of the *St. Francis* Hospital. It is cast of iron and painted in natural colors, representing *St. Francis* clad in his brown tunic girt with a cord. Details.

5. Preliminary plans are being prepared by Kansas City architect Henry F. Holt for a 40 room, three story addition to *St. Francis* Hospital, to be built fronting on Emporia Avenue at cost of \$25,000 to \$40,000.

3. The new addition to *St. Francis* Hospital extending to Emporia Avenue will be finished about November 1, according to Architect C. W. Terry. ¶ The next addition to *St. Francis*, in two or three years, will replace the original section of the building extending from the *St. Francis* Avenue entrance north to 9th Street. This is now used largely as a dormitory and the old chapel also, which has been replaced by a newer one.

5. Contract was let yesterday to Harry I. Ellis Construction Company for erection of the new \$150,000 nurses' home at *St. Francis* Hospital. To be 120 by 68 feet, on the northeast corner of 9th and *St. Francis*, facing on 9th Street, four stories, brick, with Bedford stone trim. Building to have 63 rooms. Architect is Ed Frosblom, and style of architecture is colonial. Details.

10. The new four story brick nurse's home at *St. Francis* Hospital will be dedicated Sunday afternoon. Report December 19, page 10.
